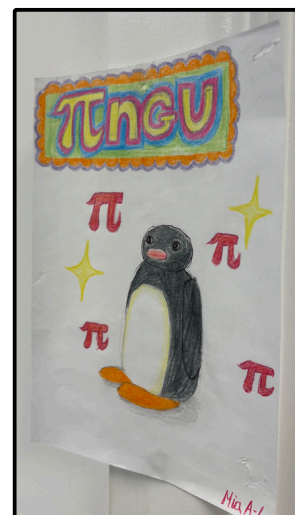
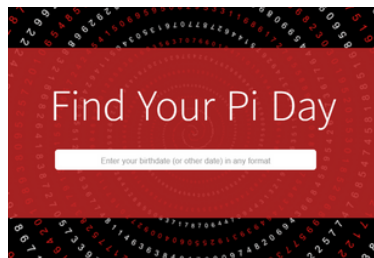
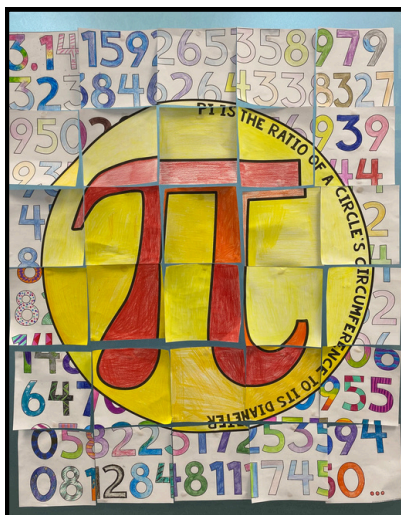

MATHS - PI DAY 2025

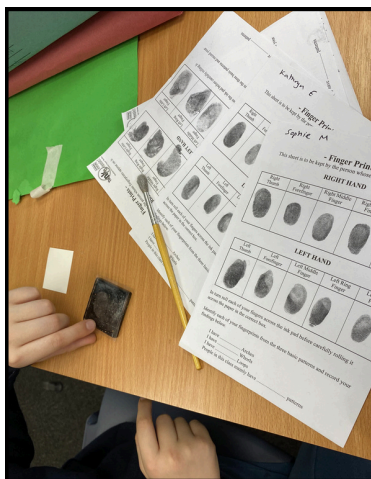

Our Year 9s have made some lovely Pi cookies for Pi Day, potato and chickpea curry, vegan Thai green curry, and hot cross buns.

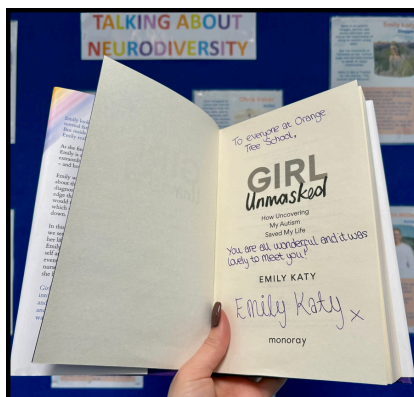

On Monday the 17th, Emily Katy, the Sunday Times Bestselling author of 'Girl Unmasked: How Uncovering My Autism Saved My Life' gave a presentation about her experiences as a neurodiverse woman, what neurodiversity means, and how it impacts everybody differently. Students and staff alike were engaged and we all had many questions for her. It was a lovely visit, and she even signed our copy of her book for us!



On Thursday the 20th, James Harrison, the Autism Lead for the Ellern Mede Group shared his deep understanding of the needs of neurodiverse students, based on his extensive experience working with Autistic people in many different settings. He held two separate sessions with KS3 and KS4 students. Students were given a safe space to share and ask questions about their own neurodiversity, which was lovely and insightful.



Thank you, Emily and James, for taking the time to visit us and inspire our students with all your knowledge. It is very important for them to see how neurodiversity is not an obstacle to living a successful, happy life.
